danny Blake 1950-2022

A legacy of leadership and compassion.


danny Blake, loving partner, beloved friend, and fierce disability advocate, passed away on Monday, April 25th at the age of 72. danny is survived by his partner of 25 years, Gene Ball, his sister Sharon Blake, and his brother Larry Blake. He is preceded by his parents Betty and James Blake and brother James Blake Jr.

Born in 1950 in Columbus, Ohio, danny was known for his sense of humor, kindness, and perseverance. danny was born with Cerebral Palsy. His family's commitment to inclusion set him on a course for life-long advocacy. At age five, danny was named the Easterseals Child of the Year and photographed with Ohio Governor Frank Lausche.

danny received a bachelor's degree from Arizona State University and a master's degree in social service administration from The University of Chicago. He was instrumental in forming Tucson's early response to HIV through his work with PACT for Life (People with AIDS Coalition of Tucson) and ultimately as director of programs for Southern Arizona AIDS Foundation.

In 1985, danny became a board member of the Cerebral Palsy Foundation of Southern Arizona (CPFSA). He was a driving force behind the agency's expansion of programs for children with disabilities. By 1993, CPFSA was serving more than just those with Cerebral Palsy and changed its name to The Blake Foundation in honor of danny. In 2019, danny was again honored for his advocacy at the 100th anniversary of Easterseals National as a participant in the Rose Parade.

danny spelled his first name with a lower-case "d" to represent how he carried his experiences as a young person living with a disability with him into his adult life. Today our communities are more inclusive of people with disabilities. danny's life serves as a reminder of how far we have come and the work left to do.



By providing disability, mental health and child welfare services, we make profound, positive differences in people's lives every day.



Behavioral Health

- Outpatient care coordination and therapy for infants, children, families and adults
- Comprehensive psychiatric and medication services
- Therapeutic residential treatment for adults with complex behavioral health needs
- Semi-independent living for adults with serious mental illness
- Family reunification therapy and support
- Behavioral health services for children in foster care

Child Welfare & Foster Care Support

- Family support and education, including preservation and reunification services
- Inclusive early childhood education
- Professional Development for child care professionals
- Emergency resources for children in foster care (food, clothing, school supplies)

Transportation

- Transportation services for individuals who are elderly or have intellectual and/or physical disabilities

Intellectual, Developmental & Physical Disability

- Residential and rehabilitative services for adults with intellectual and/or physical disabilities







A GUIDE TO OUR PROGRAMS

Live

Blake Behavioral Health

Cochise, Gila, Graham, Greenlee, La Paz, Pima, Pinal,
Santa Cruz & Yuma Counties

Individual Counseling & Family Counseling for Family Members of All Ages

Evidence-based counseling offered to children, families, and adults. All services are designed to meet the needs of the individual and family, ensuring that members receive quality care. Trained clinicians focus on strengths to support members and families through life transitions, behavioral concerns, and/or behavioral health and substance abuse challenges. Play-based therapy is utilized for young children.

Aviva Children's Services offers behavioral health services to children currently in foster care.

Therapeutic Modalities for Children & Families include:

Parent-Child Relationship Therapy: An attachment-focused therapy that strengthens the bond between a caregiver and child. Caregivers include biological parent, foster parent, adoptive parent, or kinship placement.

Child-Parent Psychotherapy: A parent-child therapy model proven to be effective with children under the age of five, who have been exposed to trauma, and their caregivers.

Equine Therapy: Equine-assisted counseling can help build emotional regulation, resiliency, insight, esteem, autonomy, communication skills, relationship skills and focus. EBF's equine-assisted counseling program does not include any riding or other mounted activities with horses. For children 6-17 and adults.

Nature-Based Therapy: Nature-based therapy provides multi-sensory opportunities to interact with the natural world, to explore relationships and build insight while motivating positive behavior change. For children 6-17 and adults.



Therapeutic Modalities for Adults include:

Individual Counseling: Goal-focused treatment to help adults safely address any behavioral health concerns. Individualized therapy plans may include addressing past trauma, sobriety and recovery goals, and developing coping skills to manage the stressors of life.

Early Recovery Skills (ERS): Based on the Matrix Model, participants learn essential skills for establishing abstinence from drugs and alcohol. Sessions teach strategies and practices to assist clients with behavior changes that support abstinence. To benefit fully from treatment, participants are encouraged to also join 12-Step or other recovery-based groups.

Relapse Prevention Group (RP): Based on the Matrix Model, these sessions are forums in which people with substance use disorders share information about relapse prevention and receive assistance in coping with the issues of recovery and relapse avoidance. The group is based on the premise that relapse is not a random event and the process of relapse follows predictable patterns. Signs of impending relapse can be identified by staff members and clients. The setting allows for mutual client assistance within the guiding constraints provided by the counselor. Clients heading toward relapse can be redirected, and those on a sound course to recovery can be encouraged.

Psychiatric Services

Psychiatric evaluation, diagnosis, medication prescription, and ongoing monitoring for relevant diagnoses. Services provided by licensed psychiatrists and nurses.

Residential Services

Behavioral Health Residential Facilities (BHRF): Residential services for adults requiring a higher level of care following a behavioral health crisis. Members do not meet the criteria for level-one inpatient services but need additional behavioral health crisis stabilization. Services include individual counseling, group and family counseling, crisis management, substance abuse education, assistance in the self-administration of medicine, and daily living skills.

Semi-Independent Living

Community-based, semi-independent living support for adults in need of additional help to live independently. Staff members focus on activities that promote the member's ability to live independently through medication management, counseling, peer support, employment support, and daily living skills.

Adult Day Services

Graham & Pima Counties

Day programs for adults with intellectual and/or physical disabilities. We utilize a person-centered approach, emphasizing independent living skills, implementing therapy plans and social/leisure activities to foster community involvement. Members are given ongoing training and support to encourage independence.

Employment Services

Cochise, Graham, Greenlee, Pima, Pinal & Yuma Counties

Employment services help adults prepare for, find, and retain meaningful employment. Members are supported to identify employment goals, overcome barriers to employment and appropriate training.

Job course professionals teach basic computer, resume writing, and interview skills as well as employment search strategies. Work adjustment training, vocational rehab programs, and a Job Club Group may also be available.

Transportation Services

Cochise, Graham, Greenlee, Pima & Santa Cruz Counties

Door-to-door transportation to maintain consistent access to community services, day programs, employment, medical and service appointments, educational and recreational activities, and social engagements for individuals with intellectual and/or physical disabilities.

Elderly and low-income individuals who require accessible transportation can also access transportation services as available.



Residential Services

Community-Based Residential Homes

Cochise, Graham, Pima & Santa Cruz Counties

Nineteen community-based, licensed group residential homes for adults and children with moderate to severe intellectual and/or physical disabilities throughout the Tucson area where adults and children (ages 12 to 80) receive individualized person-centered support and treatment strategies to ensure each person served can live, work and play in their community. Designed by the member and their team, service plans are developed based on the needs and desires of the member and their family/guardian when appropriate. Services include rehabilitation, room and board, as well as transportation. Supervision and support by trained direct support professionals are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Attendant Care & Respite Services

Graham, Greenlee & Pima Counties

In-home assistance for individuals with intellectual and/or physical disabilities who live independently in their own home or with their family/caregiver. Focuses on meeting essential personal and physical care needs, as well as basic home management. We also offer relief to primary caregivers by providing supervision, assistance with activities of daily living, community integration, and recreational activities.

Individually Designed Living Arrangements

Pima County

Person-centered residential support for adults with intellectual and/or physical disabilities living in their own homes. Coaching/assistance with independent living skills including personal care, budgeting, bill paying, menu planning, grocery shopping, home upkeep, transportation, and community involvement. Support ranges from a few hours each week to 24-hours.

Family Support Systems

Aviva Children's Services

Community, Outreach, Resource, and Education Program, CORE: Short-term program focusing on assisting foster families to connect with services and resources in the community. CORE also provides in-home support and guidance on how to navigate the Department of Child Safety, behavioral health, and educational systems. CORE is child and family focused, with the goal of helping stabilize the child and family unit.

Early Intervention

This program provides support and training in behavioral therapeutic activities and early intervention to professionals and families with children engaged with the Arizona Department of Child Safety who have special needs and/or behavioral concerns.

Family Connections

A community-based model that works with families in their homes in the context of their neighborhoods to help them meet the basic needs of their children, prevent child maltreatment, and/or eliminate danger. Families receive community resources and parenting education support to help parents safely care for their children.

Parents as Teachers

Cochise, Pima & Yuma Counties

Home visitation services for families who are expecting a child or have preschool-aged children. Personalized support including practical, hands-on activities and techniques that promote early learning, knowledge, and understanding important developmental milestones.

Parents as Teachers – Children with Special Needs

Pima & Yuma Counties

In-home family support for children birth to age 5 who are not eligible for the Arizona Early Intervention Program but exhibit developmental and/or medical challenges.

Early Head Start

Cochise, Graham, Greenlee & Pima Counties

Home visitation services that include coaching; health and developmental screenings for children; parent engagement activities; and community referrals for families with children birth to five who may have mild to moderate developmental delays.

Parent Education Groups

Pima County

Utilizing the Incredible Years and Conscious Discipline curriculum, parenting classes increase families' awareness of positive parenting, child development, and knowledge of available supports to enhance their child's overall well-being and development.

Nurse-Family Partnership

Pima, Gila, Graham & Yuma Counties

Comprehensive voluntary home visitation program for first-time, high-risk mothers who are paired with a registered nurse when the mother is pregnant through the child's second birthday. The nurse provides support and education to the mother and child including developmental screening, basic health monitoring, and referral information to the mother as appropriate.

High-Risk Perinatal Program

Cochise, Gila, Graham, Greenlee, Pinal, Pima & Santa Cruz Counties

Community nursing services are provided to facilitate the transition of the child and family from the Newborn Intensive Care Unit to their home and community. Periodic monitoring of the child's medical and developmental needs identifies infants who would benefit

from referrals to other early intervention programs.

Through these home visits, the family receives support and education, as well as referral to appropriate community resources.



Inclusive Early Childcare Centers

Children's Achievement Center

Tucson, AZ

Full-day and full-year care for children ages eight weeks to five years. This center is nationally accredited through the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). Head Start services provided.

Learn

Signal Peak Early Learning Center

Coolidge, AZ

Full-day and full-year care for children ages two to five.

Palomita Children's Center

Safford, AZ

Full-day and full-year care for children ages one to five. This center is nationally accredited through NAEYC. Head Start services provided.

Incredible Years Parent Education

Cochise, Graham, Greenlee, La Paz, Maricopa, Pima, Pinal, Santa Cruz & Yuma Counties

The leading national evidence-based early childhood development training program for parents of children ages birth to 12. Parents learn how to establish clear and predictable routines, practice self-care, and positive discipline to manage misbehavior, promote children's emotional regulation, social competence, problem solving, reading, and school readiness.

Work

Childcare Professional Development

Inclusion

Yuma County

Offers early childcare and education centers training and coaching to improve and maintain family-centered and quality inclusive programs for children. Services include assessment, goal planning, site visits, training, and skill building through targeted coaching assistance.

AZ STEPS: Arizona Statewide Training and Technical Assistance for Expulsion Prevention Support

Cochise, Graham, Greenlee, Pima & Yuma Counties

Mental health professionals provide community-based training around the needs of vulnerable children at-risk for expulsion from their childcare center.

Community of Practice

Pima County

High-quality professional development for childcare providers utilizing the Partnerships for Inclusion curriculum and The Center on the Social and Emotional Foundations for Early Learning (CSEFEL) Infant-Toddler curriculum. Participants are expected to engage in training, on-site coaching, and mentoring opportunities. Community workshops are also available.

Smart Support

Cochise, Graham, Greenlee, Pima, Pinal & Yuma Counties

Mental health consultation for childcare providers to address the social-emotional needs of children and to build staff capacity.

Quality First

Cochise, Pima & Santa Cruz Counties

Quality Improvement program for childcare providers. Services include coaching consultation, quality improvement planning and financial incentives.

Supported Employment Programs for Adults

Cochise, Graham & Pima Counties

Supported employees work closely with job coaches to gain competitive work skills in the field of their choice. Employees also receive technical expertise in adaptive equipment and workplace modifications. Worksites include Sage Ceramics Studio, Freeport McMoran Copper Recycling Program, Main Street Cafe and Banner Medical Center.



Play

Respite Services

Respite for Caregivers of People with Developmental Disabilities

Graham, Greenlee & Pima Counties

Caregivers who participate in the care of the person with developmental disabilities occasionally need a break. Respite services may include: providing non-medical health care, preparing or assisting in the preparation of meals and in eating, providing opportunities for community integration and involvement, providing opportunities for leisure, play, and other recreational activities, providing opportunities for the individual to make choices with regard to his/her daily activities. Respite is available on an hourly or daily basis, depending on the family's needs and the Arizona Division of Developmental Disabilities' authorization. There are several options where respite may be provided including at the individual's home, at the respite care provider's home, or in a community setting of the family's choice. This decision is made in consultation with the family.

Aviva Ranch Respite Services

The service allows primary caregivers to plan activities and, most importantly, help to keep families from becoming overwhelmed by their many ongoing responsibilities. The Ranch offers a day respite program for children 6–17 years of age. Respite is offered on the weekend, after school, and during school breaks.

Mr. An and Sam Levitz Raise More Than 1M!

Mr An has been hosting the Cooking with the Stars event for more than 30 years! The addition of Sam Levitz to the team has ensured that this beloved event will endure for many years to come.
